ne might think that football-minded Cowboys owner Jerry Jones couldn't hang with the campy humor from the celebs at Saturday night's Two by Two for AIDS and Art benefit. (After designer Kenneth Cole riffed about his pal Stanley Tucci's two Golden Globes, he introduced headliner Alan Cumming, who was recently honored by the queen of England. "It's so odd, because he's a queen from Scotland," Cole said. Hi-yo!)

Jerry and his wife, Gene, and their daughter, Charlotte, and her husband, Shy Anderson, laughed along from their stage-side table in a lavish tent at the estate of art patrons Cindy and Howard Rachofsky. But the Jones party turned serious when the spirited bidding started for a large Matthew Ritchie painting, A Soldier's Heart. Sotheby's auctioneer Jamie Niven, son of the late actor David Niven, was about to let the piece go for \$120,000, when Jerry almost imperceptibly lifted one finger and bought it for \$125,000. (The Joneses commissioned Ritchie to paint the enormous Line of Play above the entrance to Cowboys Stadium's main concourse.)

## Two by Two's millions

The fast and furious live auction bidding at Two by Two became so cost-prohibitive that those of us with a triple-digit net worth sat still as statues for fear of becoming indentured servants with an inadvertent nose scratch.

A Marc Quinn oil sold for \$140,000, while **Richard Phillips'** portrait of **Lindsay Lohan** fetched a staggering \$360,000. But the big winner was **Christopher Wool's** untitled silkscreen. With the artist present, it sold for \$675,000.

By the final gavel, Two by Two had brought in a record-breaking \$4.2 million, making it the single largest fundraiser for its two beneficiaries, the American Foundation for AIDS Research and the Dallas Museum of
